
Family Fun Night

OBOC Author Lynne Kelly to Visit Alliance March 21

Neither being a sign language interpreter nor a writer was really in the plans for Lynne Kelley, the author of the 2024 One Book One Community selection Song for a Whale.




"I'd planned to take just one sign language class as an

elective in college, then enjoyed it so much, I took another class the following semester," explained Kelly. "That was all the college had at the time, but I wanted to continue learning more. I started taking community education classes taught by deaf people, and that's where I learned the most. I did that for about a year and a half. By the time I graduated, I knew I wanted to pursue a career in something related to sign language. I still interpret, usually in college classes or public schools, along with the occasional medical appointment.'

Writing came along while she was working as a teacher.

"Like interpreting, [writing] was something I stumbled into and fell in love with enough to do forever," said Kelly. "I've always been a big reader, but writing a book was never something I'd considered. I was a special ed. teacher for third- through fifth-grade students when I got the idea for my first novel, Chained, about a captive elephant. At first, I was thinking it'd make an interesting story to tell my students, but later I wondered if

could turn into something for a larger audience. I had a lot to learn about writing and publishing, but the book was published six years later. Though it took a lot of time and work and patience, I found that I liked taking an idea and turning into a story.'

And although Kelly describes her writing method as a "scattered mess that usually settles into shape," she said she likes to talk about it when she appears in public as she will at the Brush Performing Arts Hall inside the Giese Center on the campus of the University of Mount Union at 7 p.m. on Thursday, March 21.

"I like to talk about the idea-to-publication journey and show some behind-the-scenes things about the book, like character brainstorming, fun facts I picked up while researching, etc.," said Kelly. "I also love answering readers' questions, so I hope to have some Q&A time!"
